Mission Statement

Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts (MCLA) is the Commonwealth's public liberal arts college and a campus of the Massachusetts state university system. MCLA promotes excellence in learning and teaching, innovative scholarship, intellectual creativity, public service, applied knowledge, and active and responsible citizenship. MCLA prepares its graduates to be practical problem solvers and engaged, resilient global citizens.

The College and Its History

Since our inception as the Normal School in North Adams in 1894, Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts (MCLA) has provided educational access and exceptional learning opportunities to generations of students and alumni. Over the years, MCLA has evolved to meet the challenges and needs of changing times. In 1932, the Normal School became the State Teachers College of North Adams, reflecting the increased importance of education as an academic discipline. In 1960, we changed our name to North Adams State College and expanded our focus to include professional degrees in business administration and computer science. In 1997, with eyes focused on the horizon of a new century, the College assumed a unique mission (within the state university system) as Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts, the public liberal arts college for the Commonwealth.

Today, MCLA continues to innovate. We guide students as they develop critical thinking, communication and leadership skills both in class and through a range of high-impact experiences. Applied learning always has been part of what the College provided to students; for many, the teacher practicum was an opportunity to learn by doing and to take what they learned into the classroom out into the field. Today, teacher preparation opportunities exist alongside arts management internships with local cultural organizations, undergraduate research in collaboration with faculty members, travel courses and study abroad, community service projects, and leadership positions in clubs, organizations and athletics teams. These activities enable students to enhance academics with practical experience and prepare them for graduate study or to launch their careers in whatever field their passion leads them.









Factbook *Data Definitions*

Academic Year

Fall and Spring semesters, for example AY 12-13 refers to academic year 2012 (Fall) - 2013 (Spring).

Accepted

Admitted by the institution.

Administrative

Individual for whom assignments require management of the institution, or a customarily recognized department or subdivision thereof. Assignments require the performance of work directly related to management policies or general business operations of the institution, department or subdivision.

African American

A person having origins in any of the black racial groups of Africa.

ALANA

Includes students from the following ethnic groups African American, Hispanic(Latino), Asian, Pacific Islanders, American Indian/Alaskan Native, Two or More Races

American Indian or Alaska Native

A person having origins in any of the original peoples of North and South America (including Central America) who maintains cultural identification through tribal affiliation or community attachment.

Asian

A person having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, or the Indian Subcontinent, including, for example, Cambodia, China, India, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, Pakistan, the Philippine Islands, Thailand, and Vietnam.

Awarded aid

The dollar amounts offered to financial aid applicants.

Census Date (*Freeze Date*)

Date, on which official enrollment data is extracted from the student information system. This generally occurs two weeks beyond the last add/drop day.

Clerical & Technical

Individual whose assignments typically are associated with clerical activities or are specifically of a secretarial nature. Includes personnel who are responsible for internal and external communications, recording and retrieval of data and/or information and other paperwork required in an office.

- or -

Individuals whose assignments require specialized knowledge or skills which may be acquired through experience, apprenticeship, on-the-job-training, or academic work in occupationally specific programs that result in a 2-year degree or other certificate or diploma.

Cohort

All students that entered this institution at the same time usually designated by matriculation year.

Commuter

Students who live in a reasonable driving distance.

Concentration

Is a focus area with a major

DHE

Abbreviation for the Massachusetts Department of Higher Education, formally the Board of Higher Education.

Enrolled

Registered in course work at time of semester census date.

Entering Freshmen

Freshmen attending any college for the first time, including those with Advanced Placement credit, with fewer than 12 semester hours of transfer credit, and those who have earned college credits prior to high school graduation and/or during summer session between high school and college matriculation.

External aid

Funds received from outside (private) sources that students bring with them (e.g., Kiwanis, National Merit scholarships). The institution may process paperwork to receive the dollars, but it has no role in determining the recipient or the dollar amount awarded.

Financial aid applicant

Any applicant who submits any one of the institutionally required financial aid applications/forms, such as the FAFSA.

Fiscal Year

Funding year that includes July 1, through June 30, for example: FY 2015 refers to the fiscal year from July 1, 2014, through June 30, 2015.

First Generation

Students that on their FAFSA have noted that either parent/guardian have complete college.

Foundation scholarships and grants

Endowed scholarships and annual gifts for which the institution determines the recipient.

Freshman

Enrolled student with less than 30 accumulated credit hours.

Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) Student Enrollment

Full-time equivalent student enrollment is based on a formula by converting student credit hours as follows: undergraduate (semester credit hours/15; annual credit hours/30), upper division (semester credit hours/15; annual credit hours/30), graduate (semester credit hours/12; annual credit hours/24).

Full-Time Student

Undergraduates: student registered for 12 or more credit hours. Graduates: Students registered for 9 or more credit hours.

Graduation Rate

Percent of students completing a degree which entered the institution; usually reported by entering freshman or transfer cohort.

Headcount Enrollment

Number of students registered at census date, regardless of student's course/credit load.

Hispanic or Latino

A person of Cuban, Mexican, Puerto Rican, South or Central American, or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race.

Institutional scholarships and grants

Tuition funded grants for which the institution determines the recipient.

Instructional (Full Time or Part Time)

Individual for whom it is not possible to differentiate between teaching, research and public service because each of these functions is an integral component of his/her regular assignment. These employees may hold academic rank titles of professor, associate professor, assistant professor, instructor, lecturer or the equivalent.

IPEDS

Abbreviation for the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System.

Junior

Enrolled student with accumulated credit hours: 60 - 89.

Major

Is a program of study leading to a degree in this field.

Maintenance

Individual whose assignments typically require special manual skills and a thorough and comprehensive knowledge of the processes involved in the work, acquired through on-the-job-training and experience or through apprenticeship or other formal training programs.

- or -

Individual whose assignments require limited degrees of previously acquired skills and knowledge and in which workers perform duties that result in or contribute to the comfort, convenience, and hygiene of personnel and the student body or that contribute to the upkeep of the institutional property.

Matriculated Student

A student who has been accepted in a major program or undeclared and who is subject to all normal academic regulations and policies of the College.

Minor

Is an area of study in which you devote some focus but not as much as you would for major.

Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander

A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Hawaii, Guam, Samoa, or other Pacific Islands.

Non-matriculated Student

A student not enrolled in a major program. Such students are not assigned class status.

Non-Resident Non-Citzen (Non-Resident Alien)

A person who is not a citizen or national of the United States and who is in this country on a visa or temporary basis and does not have the right to remain indefinitely Defined as Non-Resident Alien on federal and state reports.

Part-Time Student

Undergraduates: Student registered for fewer than 12 credit hours. Graduates: Student registered for fewer than 9 credit hours.

Professional

Individual which is employed for the primary purpose of performing academic support, student service, and institutional support, whose assignments would require either a baccalaureate degree or higher or experience of such kind and amount as to provide a comparable background.

Program Level

Level of instruction based upon degree objective (i.e., undergraduate or graduate).

Retention Rate

Percent of students enrolled from fall semester to fall semester; usually reported by entering freshman cohort.

SAT Score

Scholastic Aptitude Test score used mainly in freshman admissions.

Senior

Enrolled student with accumulated credit hours greater than or equal to 90.

Sophomore

Enrolled student with accumulated credit hours: 30 - 59.

STEM Major

STEM includes the majors of Athletic Training, Biology, Chemistry, Computer Science, Environmental Studies, Mathematics, Physics, Psychology

Student Credit Hours

Credit value of course multiplied by enrollment as of the semester census date.

Student Level (Class)

Indication of a student's progress toward a degree: freshman, sophomore, junior, senior, unclassified.

Transfer Student

Attended a higher education institution elsewhere (earned 12 or more credits). Status determined by admissions entrance code.

Undeclared

Student has not specified a major program offered by MCLA.

White

A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, the Middle East, or North Africa.

Work study and employment

Federal and state work study aid, and any employment packaged by your institution in financial aid awards.
