This is for you.


Artist Biography




Artist Statement

My digital drawings explore the intricate relationship between gender politics and life as performance, investigating how identity is both constructed and revealed in the everyday. Through music, storytelling, and visual expression, I seek to illuminate the nuanced ways in which individuals navigate societal expectations, power structures, and personal freedom.

Influenced by artists as diverse as Neil Young, Rick Springfield, and Paul McCartney, my practice weaves together elements of nostalgia, pop culture, and introspection. Their ability to craft melodies that evoke deep emotion and cultural memory serves as a foundation for my own exploration of authenticity and artifice. By synthesizing both opaque and transparent discourse, I create work that oscillates between ambiguity and revelation, encouraging viewers to question what is seen, heard, and felt.

From an early age, I was captivated by the musicality of relationships—the rhythm of conversations, the harmonies of human connection, and the dissonance of societal constraints. What begins as an experience of wonder and curiosity often transforms into a powerful nostalgia, a yearning for moments both past and imagined. Yet, within this longing lies the potential for transformation—a reimagining of the world as it could be, rather than as it is.

As subtle phenomena take shape through emergent and personal practice, they reveal hidden truths about our collective existence. Through my work, I strive to offer glimpses into the shadows of our condition—into the tensions, contradictions, and beauty that define human experience. By engaging with these complexities, I invite the viewer to step into a space of reflection, where identity is fluid, performance is perpetual, and the search for meaning is ongoing.

Dancing in the Dark, *Bruce Springsteen*, "Born In The U.S.A", Columbia Records, 1984

"Dancing in the Dark" symbolizes the struggle to find meaning or clarity amid chaos and uncertainty, a theme echoed in *Deny, Defend, Depose*, where institutional responses often obscure truth rather than illuminate it. Both works highlight how systems—whether emotional or legal—can leave individuals feeling isolated, unheard, and trapped. in the shadows.

Blue Collar Man, Styx, "Pieces of Eight", A&M Records, 1978

"Blue Collar Man" captures the relentless drive and pride of a hardworking individual fighting to maintain dignity through labor, mirroring the determination of a working father striving to support his family. Both embody a refusal to give up despite economic hardship, fueled by a need to provide, responsibility, but ultimately it comes down to love.

Weakest Moments, John Mellencamp, "American Fool", Riva Records, 1982
"Weakest Moments" reveals the vulnerability and emotional rawness that surface when defenses fall, reflecting the deep, unspoken bond between two siblings who love each other unconditionally. In their lowest points, their connection becomes a quiet source of strength, proving that love often speaks loudest in silence.

Man in the Mirror, Michael Jackson, "Bad", Epic Records, 1987
"Man in the Mirror" underscores the power of self-reflection as the first step toward meaningful change, resonating deeply with me, someone who vows to fight for a better world. It reminds us that true transformation begins within, as personal accountability fuels the courage to challenge injustice and inspire others.

Since You Been Gone, Rainbow, "Down to Earth", Polydor Records, 1979
"Since You Been Gone" echoes the ache of absence and the lingering void left by someone irreplaceable, mirroring the sorrow of missing Jim Henson, a soul who brought light and wonder to the world. His loss is felt not just in silence, but in every smile and spark of imagination he once inspired.

I Won't Back Down, Tom Petty & the Heart breakers, "Full Moon Fever", MCA Records, 1989

"I Won't Back Down" stands as a powerful anthem of resilience, perfectly reflecting the unwavering spirit of someone battling a chronic illness. Despite the pain and setbacks, the song embodies a refusal to surrender, turning struggle into strength and defiance into hope.


Live While We're Young, *One Direction*, "Take Me Home", Syco Music & Columbia Records
